FALL FELLOWSHIP PLANNED

The 1970 Fall Fellowship has been planned for November 14, at the Blytheville Air Force Base, Blytheville, Arkansas. "For Chapter Basis" will serve as the general theme of the gathering. Because of our lodges present activities in preparing for chapter tapouts next spring, the meeting will follow a business procedure instead of the normal Fall Fellowship style.

Activities will begin with procedures on election of Ordeal candidates at 1:30. Directly following the election procedures will be a needed discussion of By-Laws the lodge would set up and abide by.

Sunday morning will be filled with tapout procedures and a mock tapout ceremony. Meals and lodging on base will be provided as follows:

1. Meals - Saturday Noon (12:15) Saturday Evening (5:00) Sunday Morning (7:00). Meals will be bought on a-pay-as-you-go proposition in the base cafeteria. Two dollars should be an ample amount to cover all three meals. No meal is mandatory since some Arrowmen will not arrive until after or during the Saturday noon hour.

2. Lodging - Sleeping arrangements will be in the base gym. Please bring a sleeping bag and as desired cot and/or air mattress.

Saturday night activities available on base will be: bowling from 9:00 - 11:00 and a movie in the base theater. Church services will be held on Sunday morning at 7:45 a. m. for Catholics and 9:00 for Protestants.

Closing and dismissal will be concluded around 12:00. We strongly urge you to attend.

SUMMER SUCCESSFUL FOR O. A. Lodge Undertakings Reflected at Camp

Every Tuesday night during the camping session all Arrowmen in camp attended a meeting at the O. A. Lodge pertaining to our lodge's change from a lodge basis into a chapter basis. Chief Phillips explained what the chapters would be required to accomplish the following spring. The chapters would hold elections for Ordeal Candidates, tapout the candidates at spring camporee, hold pre-ordeal ceremony, set out candidates for night, awake the candidates in the morning, feed them breakfast, tell them to carve their arrow, set them at tasks on nearby grounds, building, forests,

etc., feed them lunch explain what has happened to them and why, set them back at work during the afternoon and dismiss them later that afternoon after recording all candidates who have gone through the ordeal.

From here the lodge would take over and hold induction-ceremonies at camp for the candidates when in camp. Chief Phillips also gave reasons for giving such responsibilities to the chapters: besides making the chapters come alive and work, it also prevents a scout from missing advancement while taking Ordeal at camp.



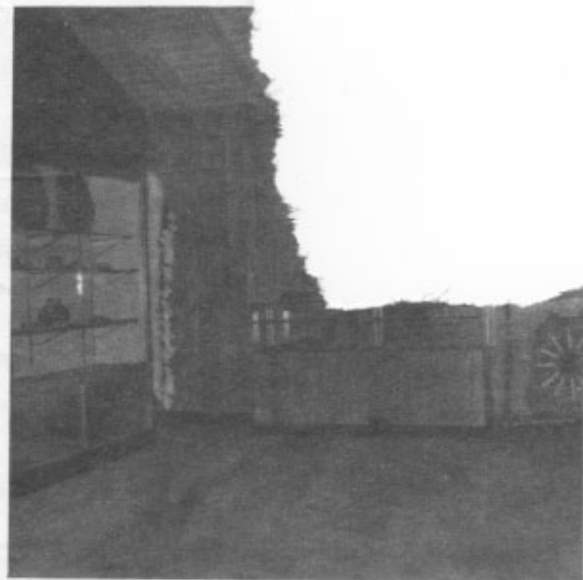
