## 25th ANNIVERSARY FALL FELLOWSHIP

Registration will begin at 8:00 a.m. The first session will begin promptly at 9:00 a.m.

We will be sleeping on cots at the camp, so bring a sleeping bag or sheets and blankets. Meals will also be served at the camp beginning with lunch on Saturday and ending with breakfast on Sunday.

Among the scheduled events for the fellowship will be an Indian seminar, with emphasis being placed on costuming and dancing. There will be a camping seminar demonstrating ways and places to camp. A slide presentation will be presented on the 1973 National Conference by members from our lodge who attended the conference. There will also be a time for Indian dances, patch trading, and recreational games. As usual, some free time will be scheduled for "fellowship" with other friends throughout the lodge.

Church services will be held on Sunday morning. The fellowship will conclude by noon on Sunday.

The church camp is located northeast of Wynne on Hiway 64. There will be signs showing the way to the camp.

The cost of the fellowship will be \$3.50. A good time will be had by all, so plan to attend.

# NATIONAL CONFERENCE REPORT

HERE IS A REPORT ON THE O.A. NATIONAL CONFERENCE FROM THE DELEGATION OUR LODGE SENT.

"New Horizons of Service" was the theme as over 4,000 Arrowmen participated in the weeklong "58th" anniversary conference of the Order of the Arrow at the University of California, Santa Barbara. Little was left to chance as the delegation from Lodge 413 boarded the Piper Senaca at Arkansas Aero at Jonesboro for the flight to St. Louis where we arrived at the St. Louis International Airport. The Boeing 707 jet was waiting and we boarded the big jet with excitement and anticipation with 171 other Arrowmen from around the country. We climbed to 39,000 feet, leveled off, and settled down for a good trip. On the flight out, we flew over the beautiful and marvelous Grand Canyon.

We arrived at Los Angeles International Airport, after some turbulence over the Rocky Mountains, and without wasting any time boarded our chartered bus for Disneyland, the first planned activity of the conference. It was a marvelous place as we spent seven hours touring the land of fantasy and imagination. Later that night, with aching feet, we arrived at U.C.S.B. After we checked in and went through the usual procedures for a conference, we fell asleep without trouble, as we had been going continuously for 24 hours without sleep. We missed breakfast the next morning, but what a day we had in beautiful, sunny California. After checking the days events we headed for the beach and the Pacific Ocean. After a morning of looking around the campus and learning where various places and things were, we had lunch and began the days activities.

Indian dance competition was first on the agenda after which we separated and went to assigned meetings: Lodge chief's meeting, band and chorus, adult leader training, as well as exhibits; a wide game, the Falconaires band, donkey softball game. We were starved and tired after that, and following dinner prepared for a fantastic opening show at the university stadium. We headed for the stadium where we saw a great show. The O.A. Choral Group, O.A. band, U.S. Air Force Academy Orchestra, stunts, singing, pictures on four large

screens, beautiful lights, and Miss Teen-age America were the first part of the great show, after which the National O.A. Chief, and the Chief Scout Executive, Alden Barber, spoke. The show ended after E. Urner Goodman was escorted to the stage and was given a standing ovation.

We began Wednesday with breakfast at De La Guera Dining Hall after which we headed for the trading post to purchase souvenirs. We attended fancy dance, straight dance, old style, Indian singing, and starting a dance team seminars. The workshops were interesting and informative. Closed circuit t.v. was used in the workshops.

After lunch, workshops attended were: Motivation and Purpose, Adult Role, Membership participation, Spirit of the Arrow, Council-Lodge-Chapter Relations, Lodge Officer Training, and Section Chief's Forum. The workshop on Ceremonies, Camp Promotion, and Lodge Program Development topped off the afternoon and all of us had sore feet from the walking.

The pace seemed to increase, as we had supper and prepared for the big Indian Show at the stadium. It was a grand show as the finalists demonstrated their skills and abilities in Indian dancing. Beautiful costumes and action was the theme as the individuals and groups performed for the final judging in the dance competition.

Thursday brought swimming and going to various workshops in the morning with a big Arrowama in the afternoon followed by a big Horizons show in the stadium. Lt. Comdr. Richard Truly - NASA astronaut - appeared and spoke to the over 4,000 Arrowmen assembled.

Friday found us on our way home after a great national conference. Those who attended were: Dean Massey - Lodge Chief; Alan Ainley - Vice-Chief; C. D. Heaton, Kenny Neece, and Roy Carden - Adult Leader.
