# PLANNED

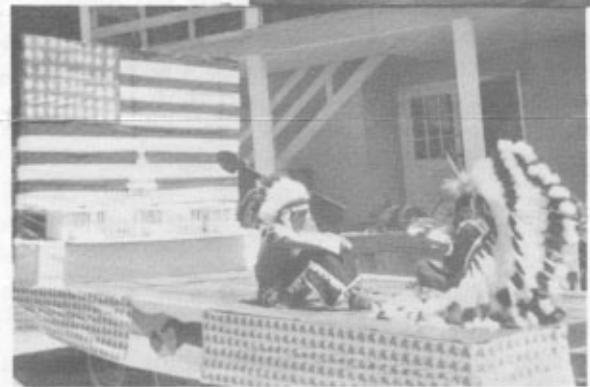
## SECTION CONCLAVE A SUCCESS

### S. E. INDIAN FESTIVAL HELD

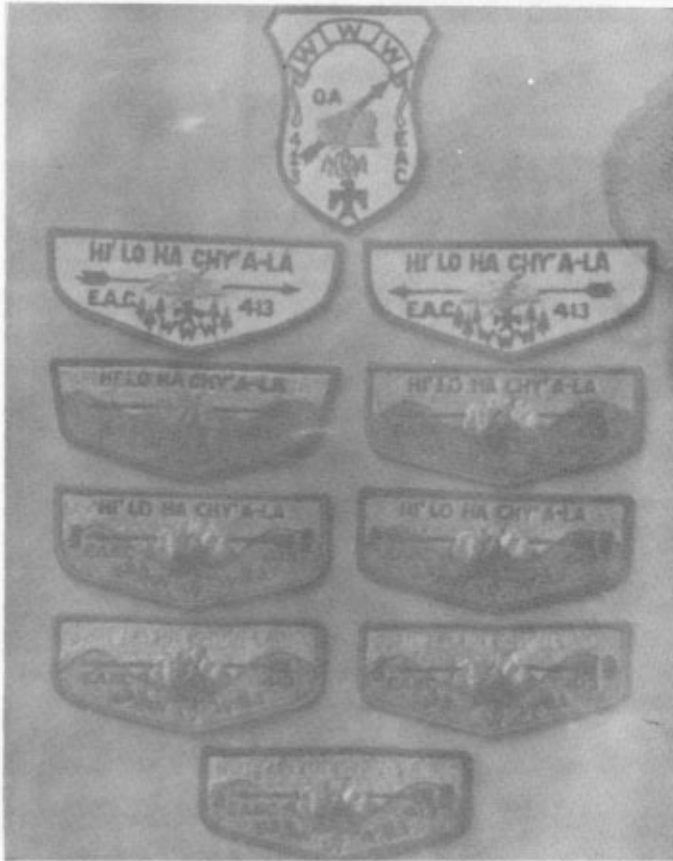

### A HISTORY OF THE 413 FLAPS

Hi' Lo Ha Chy' a-La was formed in 1948 with the first patch being issued in 1949. This first patch was in the shape of a shield with the totem of 'Thunder in the Cedar' with the WWW across the top, 413 on the left, EAC on the right and OA over the cloud. This shield was issued from 1949 to 1957.

In 1951 the lodge decided to issue a white background flap with our lodge name across the top, the arrow pointing to the wearer's left with EAC under the arrow on one side and 413 under the arrow on the other side. Our lodge totem was centered on the flap. The next year, 1952, another flap was issued that was exactly like that of 1951, except the arrow pointed to the wearer's right. It was issued from 1952 til 1966.

In 1967 the lodge issued the first fully embroidered flap. It had a dark green border, the lodge name across the top, EAC on the left under arrow, 412 on the right under the arrow. This flap was issued for eleven months in 1967.

In 1968 the three flaps now used were first issued. The only change since 1968 was the issue of the 25th Anniversary flap last year which used silver lettering.

We have tried to present the history of our lodge flaps in the hope of making our lodge members more aware of our past history through their use.

### FROM THE CHIEF . . . .

Here we are coming upon another Fall Fellowship. With your help it can be the greatest one that this lodge has ever had.

If everyone will get out for this event, like they have for earlier events this year, I know it will be great. Remember a lodge is only as good as its' Arrowmen. So get out and do your part. Be more than a flap wearer.
