JAN. 28 DATE OF BUSINESS MEETING

JENKS NAMED BSA PRESIDENT

Downing B. Jenks, St. Louis, Mo., was recently elected to the position of president of the Boy Scouts of America. In this position, he will lead in the planning and implementation of the BSA's program for more than 3 million Cub Scouts, Scouts and Explorers.

Chairman of the Board and Chief Executive Officer of the Missouri Pacific Corporation, Jenks will serve as the highest ranking volunteer in the largest youth movement in the United States.

Jenks became a volunteer Scouter in 1954 as pack committee chairman for his son's Cub Scout pack. In 1958, he became a member of the Chicago Area Council Executive Board and served there for two years before moving to St. Louis. In the St. Louis Area Council, he has served as treasurer in 1971-72 and vice-president since 1973. He has also served as North Central Region finance chairman in 1972-73 and became regional president in 1973.

His membership on the BSA Executive Board began in 1973. He has received two of Scouting's highest awards — the Silver Beaver and the Silver Antelope.

The Order of the Arrow wishes Mr. Jenks success in his new position and looks forward to welcoming him to many Order of the Arrow activities throughout the nation.

1978 CONCLAVE

The SC-1A Conclave will be held April 28-30 at Camp Tulla near Daisy, Arkansas. The theme will be "Firm Bound in Brotherhood," and will be a training and fellowship Conclave. Each lodge will be allowed to send 35 delegates and possibly more. The camp has fairly new tents with platforms and cots and mattresses. Central showers are provided featuring hot water. The camp also has a nice Dining Hall in which we will eat cafeteria style. The estimated cost will be \$15.00 excluding money provided for the state budget, therefore the cost will go up some, but not more than \$2.00, probably 50c. The camp has facilities for field sports and waterfront activities.

Dancing.* There will be 2 judges from every lodge as judges. Dance competition will be Saturday afternoon with the finals Saturday night. There will be NO religious dances without permission from the tribe. This includes the Ghost Dance, the Moon Dance, the Hopi Snake Dance, and the Apache Devil Dance. Dancing will be Large and Small group (one team from each lodge) and Solo and Fancy dancing with unlimited competition.

Chris Boswell, who hails from the southern Texas City of San Benito, is proud to be National Chief during the 62nd Anniversary Year.

The 19 year old has had a full career in the O.A. and Scouting so far. Before becoming National Chief, he was Section Chief, Section Vice-Chief, and Section Deputy Chief. In his own lodge, We-wanoma Lodge 272, he has been Unit Elections Chairman, Chapter Vice-Chief, Lodge Secretary, Lodge Vice-Chief, and Lodge Chief for two terms. He received the Vigil Honor in 1973.

Full service to the O A never swayed his devotion to scouting in general. He went on a Philmont Trek in 1972, was a participant at the 1973 National Jamboree, took part in the Kit Carson Program at Philmont in 1974, and he was a Philmont Ranger in 1976. In addition, he has been on the staff at Camp Perry for four years.

Chris' outlook upon the Order is an optimistic one: "I see the Order of the Arrow as a tremendous service organization. It is an organization with the potential to do more than can be imagined." But, Chris will be quick to state his opinion that only a portion of the lodges have taken advantage of this potential, and he feels that this is the area which needs the most work, which could be accomplished in many ways.

Long active in school, Chris will be a sophomore at the University of Texas at Austin this fall where he is majoring in business. He is the Chairman of the Law School Admission Test Preparation Committee of the Pre-Law Association. Among his interests are backpacking, swimming, tennis, and cycling.

Rick Burton began his scouting career in his hometown of Goldsboro, N. Carolina, where he joined Troop 3 in 1968. In 1971 he was inducted into Naya Win Rar Lodge 296, and in 1974 and 1975 he served two terms as Lodge Chief. Rick attended the National O A Conferences in 1973 and 1975, serving as his Lodge's Representative in 1973. Then in 1975 he served as Section SE-3A Vice-Chief; and in 1976 he was elected Section Chief.

In his troop, Rick has earned both the Eagle Scout rank and the God and Country Award. In 1973 he was chosen as SPL for his Council's Delegation to the National Jamboree-East. In addition to this he has also served five years as a staff member at his council camp.

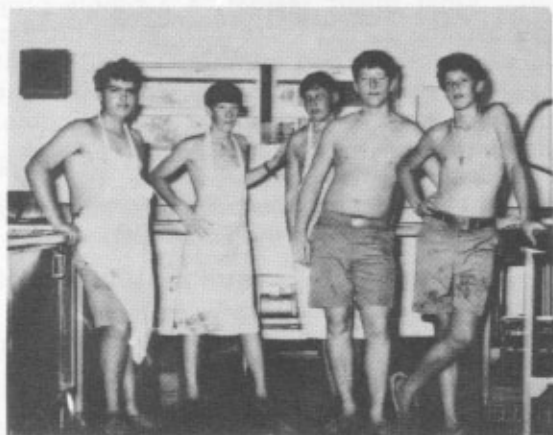
THE PAST CHIEFS OF
