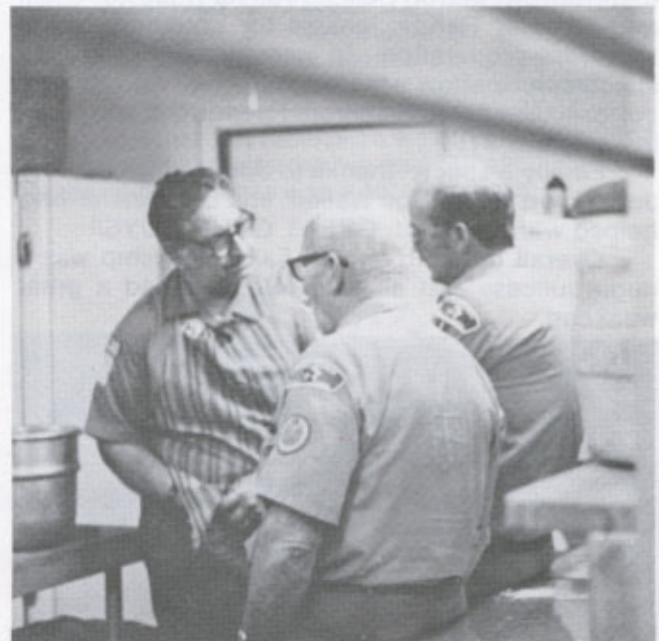
The Business Meeting should be over by 3:30. **Every Arrowman should try to be present at this very important meeting.**

This session will last for approximately 40 minutes. The 2nd, and longest session of the day will deal with the 1981 SC-1A Conclave which we will host this spring. During this session, Arrowman will get up to date information on the Conclave and a chance to meet the people heading up all of the Conclave Committees. Next, a session will be presented on how to properly conduct unit elections. We will adjourn for lunch at 11:45. Each Arrowman needs to bring enough money to eat lunch at one of the many restaurants surrounding A.S.U. After lunch there will be a slide show and information session on the upcoming National Conference, in Austin, TX. After this session Lodge Officer elections will be held. We will then break off into Chapters to elect Chapter Officers.

The Lodge Officer Nominating Committee will convene at 9:15 and should be over by lunch. If your chapter chief contacts you to serve on this committee, please help out. This is one of the most important committee meetings we have all year. The Vigil Nomination Committee will go into session promptly at 12:30. This committee has been selected and contacted. NATIONAL CONFERENCE

Close upon the heels of the 1981 National Scout Jamboree will be the 1981 National Order of the Arrow Conference.

This conference will be held at the University of Texas, Austin, August 10, 1981-August 14, 1981.

The first meal will be the evening meal of August 10 and the final meal will be breakfast on August 14. The closing show will follow this breakfast and Arrowmen will be homeward bound by 11:00 a.m.

As of this date the Conference fee will be between \$130.00 and \$150.00 per participant. Food prices will play an important part in the final fee figure. Reservation forms are being developed and will be mailed to councils and lodges after the conference planning meeting this December 27-30.

Austin, Texas is the northeastern gateway to the Texas "hill country" and boasts beautiful scenery; Lyndon B. Johnson Library, state capitol and associated features. Austin, Texas is served by several major highways including Interstate Highway 35.

NATIONAL INDIAN SEMINAR

The hills and valleys of Beaumont Scout Reservation near St. Louis, MO., throbbed with the beat of Indian drums. One hundred twenty-five Arrowmen participated first in a teaching powwow, then a midweek practice powwow, and finally a full blown powwow on Friday, the closing night of a highly successful OA event.

One hundred twenty-five participants and 67 faculty/staff members devoted 6 full days and parts of 2 Saturdays and became deeply involved in many phases in relating to several Indian cultures. Cultures studied at this year's seminar were: Southern Plains, Northeast, Northern Plains/Plateau, and Southeast.

Special guests and consultants of the seminar were Melanie Tallmadge, Miss Indian America XXVI, Nattie Shawaway of the Yakima Tribe and the Order's good friends Scott and Doris Tonemah, Kiowa and Caddo Tribes, respectively.

Outstanding courses of instruction were available to participants on a scheduled basis. Many topics were scheduled throughout the seminar with several on a repeat basis.

After a brief presentation on the history of the Order of the Arrow, participants realized they were in for a great experience when they received an overview of the seminar. Two hundred slides were presented in 20 minutes to outline the opportunities available. Any Arrowman who left the seminar feeling "short-changed" could only blame himself.

The seminar was an extremely successful order of the Arrow event featuring good food, fine facilities, good camping, and excellent instruction.
