Secretary - Don Porter

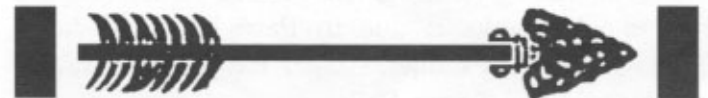
Treasurer - Richie Ermett

All in all, Fall Fellowship was a very memorable time for all in attendance.



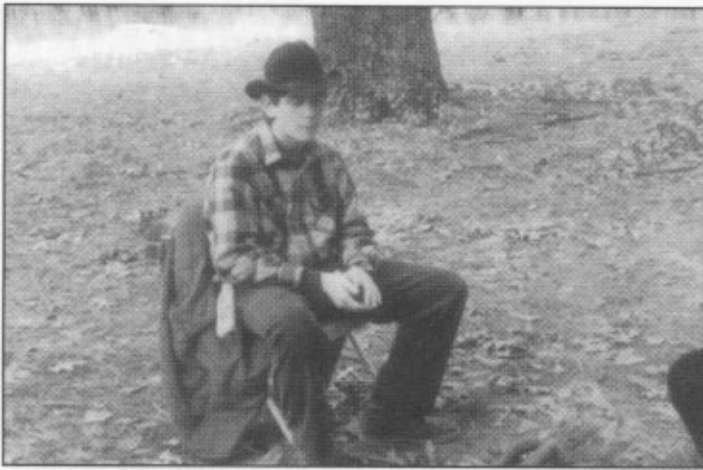
NEW OFFICERS READY FOR 1999!
